Personal Statement

- Up to 4000 characters or 47 lines limit (including spaces)
- Component of UCAS application (deadline 15 October)

What to include

- Why medicine?
- How your previous studies and academic subjects relate to medicine?
- Relevant aspects of placements, volunteering and experiences how they have influenced you as a person and your decision to be a doctor;
- Further steps you took to investigate deeper or read around the subject;
- Other achievements, activities or training that demonstrate you have the qualities or potential to succeed;
- Other co-curricular activities and interests.

How to write it

- *Introduction:* Begin with an opening that encourages admission officers to read on (an experience, a personal story, a quote, etc)!
- Content: Don't just list out medical placements and experiences, instead reflect about the effect of these experiences on you (this should make up the bulk of your statement). You can also include a paragraph on your academics and on extra curricular activities, but again elaborate on the links to medicine or to the qualities that allow you to be capable medical student or future doctor.
- Conclusion: Summarise the qualities that make you a good candidate. Reinforce your commitment and enthusiasm in pursuing medicine.
- * Be sure to check for spelling, grammar and punctuation mistakes.
- ** Leave enough time to get feedback on the draft from parents, teachers and counsellors.

Traditional: preclinical and clinical years: subjects such as anatomy, physiology and biochemistry taught separately. (Oxford and Cambridge)

Integrated: system-based teaching - anatomy, physiology and biochemistry of a particular system taught together. (Most medical schools)

PBL (problem-based learning): student-directed group work based on medical cases. (Barts, St. George's, Newcastle, Manchester)

Entry requirements

5 years: some offer the option to add an intercalated BSc.

6 years: intercalated BSc included.

BMAT (Biomedical Admissions Test)

- 2 hour written test at school or at the **British Council**
- Prepare by covering GCSE sciences and math, and do practice questions
- One test per year and valid for one vear:
- Required by: Cambridge, Oxford, UCL, Imperial, Keele, Lancaster and Leeds.
- 3 sections and time pressured
